Trout Fishing To Continue After Sept. 11

Although midnight, September 11, marks an end to Michigan's 1960 regular trout season and all fishing in designated trout streams will be closed, the fair catches during the September 12 - November 30 fall season in a score of lakes and streams designated by the Conservation Department.

Brook trout will remain open to fishing through October 15 in Swazy and Airport lakes and through November 15 in the Department research project.

LAKE TROUT may be taken throughout the fall in non-trout lakes. Catching is generally better, luck seeking out these fish during the fall spawning season than in the spring when they resist to keep waters.

Warm-water fishing on non-trout waters is often better in the fall with cooler temperatures and less wind than in the summer. Largemouth bass and northern pike strike quite readily during the fall months. Some of the best lake fishing is done in the Great Lakes during the fall.

Duck Hunters Lose 2 Targets

Michigan's duck hunters this fall will be the same as last year and general bag limits as in 1959 but canvasbacks and redheads won't be among their legal targets, the Conservation Department announced.

Federal options released to states this week as the framework of 1960 waterfowl regulations placed both of these diving ducks off limits to hunters in the continent's four major flyways. During the last two hunting seasons, canvasbacks and redheads best received protection through lowered bag limits.

Their wintering populations in the Mississippi flyway, which includes Michigan, are at the lowest on record this year. Also, losses from pollution in the Detroit River last winter took a heavy toll on brood stocks of these two species.

Michigan's new regulations will save motorists millions of dollars in fuel economy and brake wear because they eliminate stop-and-go driving.

FHS Student Completes Summer Science Course

Peter Rheinstein, 16, son of Mrs. Frank Rheinstein of 3160 Lamar was one of 56 students chosen to attend the Summer Science Training Program for Secondary School Students at the Colorado School of Mines in Golden. The program, which ran from July 11 to August 20, was sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

Peter was first introduced to the possibility of attending the Colorado School of Mines last April by Mrs. James Williams, Chemistry teacher at the High School. In an exchange of correspondence, Peter received application forms to fill out by himself and by the school. From thousands of applicants, 56 top-notch students from high schools all over the United States were selected.

On the basis of his achievements, aptitude and ability, Peter was one of the 53 boys and three girls. His high school ranking was the highest at Farmington High on both the National Merit Scholarship and the Michigan Mathematical Society Honoring Lists. The National Science Foundation and the School of Mines paid all tuition and other expenses incurred during the course. The students contributed one-half of their travel expenses, one half of their board, and paid for their books.

THESE included a tour through the Martin Company which produces government missiles, and a trip to the United States Geological Survey at the Federal Center in Denver where they viewed the entire map-making process. The group also visited the Experimental Mine at Idaho Springs where they were guided through a fascinating series of tunnels which were many miles long another solid rock.

The last day the students took another battery of tests to determine what they had actually derived from the six weeks' session. Before leaving Colorado, Peter and the other students visited many of the students' homes in Denver where they toured the state capital, visited the civic center, and viewed the city's fine attractions.

"After six weeks of hard work and many accomplishments, Peter returned home Sunday, August 21. As a result of this wonderful opportunity, Peter gained a better understanding of the Chemical and Geological fields of Science." He "also became acquainted with people from all over the country."

On the lighter side - Peter was glad he had a number of letters to write. It was the first time he had been west of Lake Michigan.

PETER IS NOW in his senior year of high school and is very active in many organizations. He works for the school paper; is Business Editor of the yearbook; is a member of the Chess Club, Debate Club, Discussion Club, Student Council, and the Young People's Society of Temple Bethel.

Said 1960 Sanitary Sewer Bonds will be dated May 1, 1960, shall consist of 23 bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each numbered consecutively in direct order of maturity from 1 to 23, inclusive, and will mature serially as follows: \$1,000.00 December 1, 1960; \$2,000.00 December 1, 1961; \$3,000.00 December 1, 1962; \$4,000.00 December 1, 1963; and each of the years 1963 and 1964.

Said 1960 Sanitary Sewer Bonds will be dated May 1, 1965; \$2,000.00 December 1, 1966; \$3,000.00 December 1, 1967; \$2,000.00 December 1, 1968; \$3,000.00 December 1, 1969. Bonds of said issue numbered 1 to 23, inclusive, maturing in the years 1965 to 1969, both inclusive, may be redeemed at the option of the City in lower numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after December 1, 1962, at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption. Notice of redemption shall be given by the City at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the City in lower numerical order, as part of its regular series, notices of sales of municipal bonds in Michigan, and shall be upon redemption shall accrue after the date of such notice. Said bonds shall be coupon bonds and shall bear interest from their date at a rate of not exceeding five percent (5%) per annum, expressed in multiple of 1/2%, and interest shall be payable on December 1, 1960, and semi-annually thereafter on June 1 and December 1st of each year. The interest rate for each coupon period on any such bond shall be the rate in effect on the principal and interest shall be payable at a bank or trust company to be designated by the purchaser of the bonds. Accrued interest to the date of delivery of such bonds shall be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

In addition to special assessments, said bonds pledge the full faith, credit and resources of the City of Farmington for their payment.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the actual value of all interest on the bonds from October 1, 1960, to their maturity and deducting the cash value of such bonds as they are offered. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid is the lowest interest cost to the City. No proposal or purchase of less than all of the bonds herein offered or a price less than their par value will be considered.

A certified cashier's check in the amount of \$500.00, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the City of Farmington must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds.
